Federal officials declare Avalon's flood plan "amazing"

Best coastal flood plan from Nags Head, North Carolina to Maine saves residents 20% on flood insurance premiums

Flood protection

An aggressive decade-long campaign to minimize the potential for flood damage in the borough has paid off.

Borough property owners can expect a 20% discount on flood insurance in fall 2007. The mitigation plan includes carefully tending the dunes, building a \$14 million sea wall and underground pumping stations, while designating special flood hazard areas as open space.

"It's an amazing achievement," said FEMA spokeswoman Barbara Lynch. "[Avalon] is the only coastal town north of Nags Head to have done this," she added.

Only eight percent of all towns that participate in the Community Rating System (CRS) of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) nationwide have achieved a Class 6 rating.

Insurance savings

Avalon residents can save 20 percent each year on flood insurance bills or about \$114 off the average insurance premium. "It results in about a \$600,000 borough-wide savings," said Councilman Richard Dean.

"The CRS rewards planning and flood mitigation procedures," said FEMA Region II Director Stephen

Kempf, Jr. "No place is more vulnerable than a barrier island. **Avalon should serve as a beacon showing the rest of the region what planning can do,**" he added.

Anniversary of the great '62 storm

The announcement comes just days after the 45th anniversary of the catastrophic nor'easter that battered New Jersey's barrier islands in 1962.

"Avalon spent its own money because we can't expect the federal government to bail us out in the future," said Mayor Martin Pagliughi. "It's time we begin to take the rise in sea level seriously."

"The discount is important but community safety is more important," said Dave Knoche, Avalon resident and president of the Avalon Home and Land Owners Association.

New dawn for Avalon

The story of Avalon's rebirth began with a bold vision by borough officials, Mayor Martin Pagliughi, and the Avalon Borough Council.

Together, they fought to secure millions for Avalon, encouraged new business development, and used shared services, plus non-tax revenue, to reduce the tax burden on residents.

Upgraded public facilities

The plan included upgrading borough facilities such as the Public Works Complex, Borough Hall and Senior Citizen Center, recreation areas, public gardens, school/community library, historical museum,

emergency services, technology equipment, utilities, roads and shore protection projects.

Federal, state funds for beaches

The borough successfully obtained federal and state funds in partnership agreements to construct necessary shore protection projects. "Obtaining federal and state funds have helped keep our taxes low," said Mayor Martin Pagliughi. They include **\$9.2 million in federal money to fund part of the sea wall and \$2.2 million in state funds** for the 8th Street jetty.

Expanded commercial rateable base

The borough's public investment in streets, sidewalks, benches, and other public infrastructure is paying dividends. Private developers have constructed over 12,500 sf of new

commercial space to help create a pedestrian-friendly shopping district for our residents and visitors.

Commercial tax rateables also rose by 42% since 2005.

Controlling costs, sharing services

Inter-local partnerships and agreements with local, county, state and federal agencies contribute significantly to Avalon's cost savings.

"We worked to develop coalitions with Avalon's neighboring governments," said Avalon Borough Council President Dr. Nancy Hudanich. "By sharing the cost of essential services, like insurance, with other municipalities, we get a **better rate and reduce the tax burden** on our residents," she added. Avalon shares services in more than two dozen agreements.

Mayor Martin Pagliughi: Borough is in great shape

Message from Mayor Martin Pagliughi

The financial state of the Borough is good. Our rateable base rose from \$8.5 billion to \$8.6 billion this year. But a new 4% cap in 2008 on tax revenues enacted by the NJ Legislature will challenge us to raise sufficient revenue going forward. We did not generate a sufficient surplus last year to help offset this year's increases.

Because the 2007 budget becomes our starting year, the borough had to set a new revenue base to position itself for the future to continue to provide excellent services.

We have to increase our 2007 budget by 3.86% to \$18.615 million. Major increases include contracts, pensions, debt payments, and other fixed costs. However, in addition to tightening our belts, we will continue to seek other non-tax revenue sources.

Notwithstanding, the new budget will result in a tax increase of 1.3¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation. Avalon continues to rank in the lowest 1% of overall property tax rates of New Jersey's 566 municipalities.

Beach replenishment

The borough is committed to maintaining Avalon's beaches. Last year, we dredged 350,000 cubic yards of beach-quality sand from Townsend's Inlet onto the beaches between 9th and 18th Streets. The work cost \$2.8 million. The emergency work improved the beaches. Although erosion is not as severe as in 2006, this year we are adding another 150,000 cubic yards in the same location.

Veterans Plaza

We completed Veterans Plaza by Memorial Day 2006. The open, steel-framed pavilion at 21st Street Circle on Dune Drive completes the Dune Drive Roadway and Streetscape. It has become a popular **gathering place for the community**. Each Friday this summer, from June 29 to August 24, the Plaza will host a free concert at 7 p.m.

Customer service training

Last spring and summer, the Avalon Home and Land Owner's Association (AHLOA) conducted a survey of its members. The survey asked residents about experiences with the Police/Fire/Rescue Departments, Recreation and Parks, Public Works, Borough Administrators/Clerks, and the Zoning/Code/Construction offices.

Most departments received good scores. They ranged from a high of 90% for the rescue squad, for example, as "excellent" or "very good." to a low rating of 50%.

AHLOA members think our borough employees do a good job. However, we can and will improve our employee performance.

The Borough hired *eXperience HR* to examine customer service issues. Its employees interviewed department heads and staff and shared their findings. The company will schedule a one-day retreat to develop solutions. They will also attend monthly staff meetings and conduct a second survey to test improvement. We're committed to providing the best customer service possible.

Avalon Days "Fun Up" the Summer

Last summer, three important Avalon agencies — the Borough Government, the Avalon Chamber of Commerce, and the Avalon Business Consortium—joined efforts for the first time to pursue a \$75,000 grant from the New Jersey Office of Travel and Tourism. The grant, along with \$25,000 from local businesses and \$30,000 from the library, will create *Avalon Days*, pending grant approval.

Avalon Days will feature a seafood festival, expanded boat parade, and an arts and crafts gala. *Avalon Days* unites these signature activities with traditional summer activities under one fiscal umbrella. *Avalon Days* inaugurates its annual festivities with the "Symphony by the Sea."

The grant enhances New Jersey and Avalon's status as premier vacation destinations. The signature events will attract local vacationers. But the coalition believes the *Days* will also appeal to people in the tri-state area. The events showcase Avalon's best features — great residents, natural dunes, expansive beaches, pedestrian-friendly neighborhoods, and outdoor fun venues.

- **Avalon Fresh Seafood Festival.** Local residents know this 15-year tradition offers two days of crafts, entertainment, and seafood specialties on Columbus Day weekend. The Chamber wants to involve every restaurant in the event, even those that closed at the end of the season. Festival contests include fresh chowder making, art and photography, clam pitching, and a fishing contest.

- **Symphony by the Sea (pg. 4).** Begun this year, the symphony will become part of *Avalon Days*.

- **Avalon Dock, Bay and Boat Parade.** This event will showcase Avalon's beautiful bays and lagoons. It will start at the Avalon Yacht Club and circle back to the lagoons off 40th and 55th Streets. It will pass by 14 of Avalon's public docks. Decorated boats and homes will compete for cash prizes.

- **Arts and Crafts Gala.** This outdoor festival will partner with Avalon's three art galleries. It is planned for 30th Street Causeway.

Shared services, outsourcing save tax dollars

Avalon believes in and practices sharing service with other communities so we don't needlessly duplicate costs. Right now, we have about two dozen shared agreements, some going back 20 years.

One of our favorites is the Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund. Through this co-op, we save **\$727,300 insuring and managing risk** for all borough and library functions. In 2007, we'll pay only \$335,500 in premiums that would have cost over a million dollars in the commercial insurance market.

When it's less expensive to hire

out, we do. Contracts with vendors for two major budget items — trash collection and water, storm and sewer services— save us costs and taxes.

For example, the 10-year agreement with New Jersey American Water Company **reduces our annual expenses by 19% and saves us \$100,000 annually.**

In addition, we're always on the lookout for revenue sources other than taxes. Example: Avalon will receive \$750,000 over five years for cellular antenna leases on the 39th Street water tower. The funds help stabilize the water and sewer rate.

Master plan

This year, our Planning/Zoning Board will prepare to retain our "Town Center" designation we received in 1999 from the state's office of *Smart Growth*. A new five-year plan is due in 2008.

The Planning and Zoning Board and Council collaborated to write and pass ordinances affecting construction — lot size, accessory structures, swimming pools, preservation of marina use, parking, landscaping, storm water runoff, rezoning parts of the business district, and beach protection.

Public safety

This year, much needed improvements are planned for the Public Safety Complex, which houses police, fire, rescue and emergency management services. A revised design will meet our needs and budget. Also included will be a 24/7 public restroom.

Road repaving

Avalon repaved 65% of borough roads since 1991— or 24.7 miles.

In 2007, Avalon enters the last year of a five-year program to repave borough roads. Roads to be repaved this year:

Bike Lane

Last fall, we completed the Dune Drive Bike Lane extending the full length of the Drive in both directions

The \$77,500 project was worth the cost, providing healthful, safe biking for residents and guests. It conforms to federal and state codes. Bikers enjoy this popular addition.

Borough Bits

New trash collection ordinance

- The borough's contractor will collect trash only from containers that are 35 gallons or less and weigh 50 pounds or less. **Plastic trash bags must be in cans.**
- They will collect **bulk trash** set curbside at the beginning and end of the season, during the weeks of *May 4 to May 13 and August 31 to September 9.*
- This year, the borough will follow the **summer collection schedule from April 30 to September 15.**

Sea wall is dangerous

Borough officials remind everyone that pedestrians are not allowed to walk on the sea wall. Unlike jetties, the sea wall is designed to break up waves using large rocks and water circles. These are very dangerous, especially when wet. Please stay off — it's the law.

Beach tags

To help offset the cost of maintaining and protecting the beaches. Avalon requires beach tags for anyone 12 years or older from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. June 1 through September 3.

Pre-season tags can be purchased at the beach tag booth in the Community Hall before May 31. Beach tags can also be purchased daily from April 30 through September 3 at the booth or from inspectors on the beach, starting June 1.

- Weekly tags: \$10 (Valid Sat.-Sun.)
- Daily tags: \$5

Avalon's and Stone Harbor's popular trolley service will return for 2007. The regular service will begin June 30 and end Labor Day weekend. It will run from noon through 10 p.m. each day, departing from Avalon and Stone Harbor every 30 minutes.

Passengers can pick up the trolley from any corner on the route by waving a hand. They can also call a driver (609-846-4062 or 4065).

Usual fare is \$2; however, those going to Avalon's Library, Museum, Borough Hall, Community Hall or ball fields ride free. Participating merchants also offer free return trips.
